Jameer Nelson sat on the hardwood of Continental Airlines Arena, drained and depleted, as his final shot in a Saint Joseph's uniform caromed off the rim. At the other end of the court, the Oklahoma State Cowboys celebrated their Final Four berth with jubilation, having survived a nail-biter, 64-62, in their Elite Eight matchup with Nelson and the Hawks. The most exhilarating season in the history of Saint Joseph's came to an unfortunate halt that night in East Rutherford, but 10 years later, the memories and the accomplishments still remain vivid in the collective consciousness of the Saint Joseph's community.

The 2003-04 Hawks came into the season with chips on their shoulders and a razor-sharp focus. The 2002-03 season ended with a disappointing loss to Auburn in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, and after testing the waters of the NBA Draft, Jameer Nelson decided to come back for his senior season on Hawk Hill. With its star point guard back in the mix, Saint Joseph's prepared to finish what it had started the year before.

Coming into the 2003-04 season ranked in the Top 25 nationally, expectations abounded.

"They made their mark the year before (in 2002-03)," said Don DiJulia, SJU's Director of Athletics. "They opened the 2003-04 season on a national stage against a national program. Keeping the team focused and managing the hoopla that reached a level that was almost unprecedented [was most impressive]. It was going to follow them throughout the year."

DiJulia knows all about managing expectations. As an undergraduate at Saint Joseph's, he was a member of the 1964-65 SJU men's basketball team that finished the regular season with a record of 26-1 and a top-10 national ranking under head coach Dr. Jack Ramsay. It is not hard to draw comparisons between the two teams.

"There were a lot of similarities [between the two teams]," DiJulia recalled. "That team was coming off of success the year before. They had a good mix of veterans and new guys. They were really strong in the back-court, just like the 2003-04 team. They had a belief in each other that they can win every game. That matters."

Rob Sullivan, SJU's Director of Basketball Operations, was a member of the 2003-04 team and has been with the program since

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graduating in 2006. He credits the team's leadership, both the players and coaches, for getting back on the winning path.

"It was all about accountability," Sullivan said. "The leaders held everyone accountable to play to a certain standard."

Led by the tremendous backcourt play of Nelson, Delonte West and Pat Carroll, masterful managing by head coach Phil Martelli, and solid contributions from its role players, a supporting cast consisting of Dwayne Jones, Chet Stachitas, John Bryant and others, Saint Joseph's got off to a hot start and never looked back.

After opening the season with a win against nationally ranked Gonzaga, the Hawks reeled off 14 straight wins to open the season before they faced off against Atlantic 10 rival Xavier, on the road, in one of their first gut-check moments of the season. West, the 6-foot-4 junior guard, put together a performance and a stat line that would make any basketball fan swoon. West scored a career-high 33 points and added six rebounds, five assists and three steals. He was perfect from the field, shooting 12-for-12, including 3-for-3 from beyond the arc. Nelson chipped in 28 points in the come-from-behind win and the Hawks were 15-0.

The Hawks had pushed their record to 18-0 when they faced off against archrival Villanova at the Pavilion. In a game that was supposed to be played at The Palestra, the typical home for Big 5 matchups, the game was rescheduled and the venue changed, adding extra venom to the rivalry.

After withstanding a barrage of three-pointers and seeing the Hawks storm out to a 27-8 lead, the Wildcats clawed back to cut the lead to 54-50 with less than seven minutes remaining. However, the Hawks made some clutch free throws and played their hallmark pressure defense to push the lead to 10 before ultimately putting away the Wildcats, 74-67. They were 19-0 and the undefeated season was well within reach.

After burying Temple under a cascade of three-pointers the next game, the Hawks steamrolled through Atlantic 10 play un-

scathed when they faced off against St. Bonaventure on March 2, 2004, with the Bonnies being the only team standing between them and a perfect 27-0 regular season.

The Bonnies never stood a chance.

The Hawks blasted St. Bonaventure, 82-50, at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse and became the first team since the 1991 UNLV Runnin' Rebels to finish the NCAA regular season undefeated. Led by suffocating pressure defense and prolific outside shooting, the perfect Hawks reached number one in the *USA Today/ESPN* coaches' poll for the first time in school history.

After finishing the regular season with an unblemished record, the Hawks tasted defeat for the first time on March 11th against Xavier in their first Atlantic 10 tournament game. The Hawks fell, 87-67, and entered the NCAA Tournament with an at-large bid and a record of 27-1.

When the tournament bracket was announced, the Hawks had earned a number-one seed along with Stanford, Kentucky and Duke.

SJU ran through 16-seed Liberty in the first round and eighth-seeded Texas Tech in the second round. A showdown with Chris Paul and the fourth-seeded Wake Forest Demon Deacons in the Sweet Sixteen was on deck.

The Hawks were pushed to the limit, but rallied to a close win over Paul and the Demon Deacons, thanks in large part to 24 points apiece from Nelson and West. Carroll also added 17 points and eight rebounds to help keep Wake Forest at bay, holding on for a 84-80 victory.

The Hawks were one game away from the Final Four, with Eddie Sutton's Oklahoma State Cowboys being the only thing standing in the way of college basketball's Holy Grail.

With less than a minute remaining in the Elite Eight matchup, Pat Carroll hit a three-pointer to give the Hawks a 62-61 lead. Oklahoma State responded on its next possession. John Lucas hit a three-pointer from the corner to put Oklahoma State up by

two with 6.9 seconds remaining, setting up one last chance for Saint Joseph's.

It was only appropriate that, in a season where he would cement himself as a Saint Joseph's legend and the best player in college basketball, it was Nelson who pushed the ball up the court with the fate of Saint Joseph's miraculous season hanging in the balance. Like Delonte West said after the game, "I'll take my chances with him every day for the rest of my life."

Nelson zipped across half-court with a fury and was met by the outstretched arms of OSU's Daniel Bobik at the foul line. Nelson stepped back and hoisted a fadeaway jumper that ultimately fell short, hitting the front of the rim. The Hawks had come up just short of the Final Four, which would have been a storybook ending to such a magical season.

Nelson's senior season is one of the most decorated in NCAA history. He received every major Player of the Year Award, including the prestigious Wooden and Naismith

Awards. The 5-foot-11 floor general finished the season averaging 20.6 points, five rebounds, and five assists per game.

Nelson, the pride of Chester, Pa., was drafted 20th in the 2004 NBA Draft by the Denver Nuggets and then traded to the Orlando Magic, where he has spent the entirety of his NBA career. He made his first All-Star appearance in 2009, averaging 16.7 points and 5.4 assists before suffering a torn labrum. Along with Dwight Howard, he helped guide the Magic to the NBA Finals that season for the first time since 1995.

West declared for the 2004 NBA Draft, foregoing his senior season on Hawk Hill, and was selected 24th overall by the Boston Celtics. In his eight NBA seasons, West averaged nearly 10 points and four assists per game with Boston, Cleveland, Dallas and Seattle. West was effective and efficient in his various roles, particularly in Cleveland during the Cavaliers' 2009 playoff run to the Eastern Conference Finals, when he averaged nearly 14 points per game.

Together, Nelson and West not only formed the greatest backcourt in Saint Joseph's history, but arguably the greatest backcourt in Big 5 history as well.

Martelli won various Coach of the Year honors as the Hawks finished the 2003-04 season with a 30-2 record, the best in Saint Joseph's storied basketball history.

"Coach really had everyone buy into the philosophy of team basketball," said Sullivan. "His greatest strength was getting everyone to buy into his culture and holding everyone to that standard."

For most people associated with the team, it's hard to believe the last 10 years have flown by as fast as they have. The memories of the games and the moments will live on forever in Saint Joseph's basketball lore, and that team's connection with the school, administration and the community will not be soon forgotten.

"They were just a special group of people committed to one another and the task at hand," DiJulia said.

"It was an unbelievable ride. It gave people all across the country an opportunity to see Saint Joseph's," added Sullivan.

Everyone has a favorite moment from that year, something that they'll never forget. For DiJulia, it was hearing that announcement on Selection Sunday, the culmination of a year's worth of unforgettable moments. For those few seconds, Saint Joseph's had the national stage all to itself.

"They announce the whole bracket, all the number-one seeds," he said. "But, the last one they announced was '*In the Meadowlands Regional, the last number-one seed, playing in Buffalo...the Saint Joseph's University Hawks.*'"

Patrick Maggitti '89 graduated from Saint Joseph's University with a degree in chemistry and now, nearly a quarter of a century later, serves as the Dean of the Helen and William O'Toole Villanova School of Business.

During his time at Saint Joseph's, Dean Maggitti played on the golf team in addition to working full time in the laboratories at SmithKline Beecham (currently known as Glaxo-SmithKline). After realizing that working in the labs was not what he wanted to do, Maggitti knew he needed to be out in front of people, interacting with customers and clients. He got the chance to start up two manufacturing representative companies, which became wildly successful.

Maggitti soon realized that his chemistry degree left him lacking in specific business knowledge; thus, he earned a master's of business administration degree from Johns Hopkins University. Striving for more, Maggitti's thirst for education in business was not yet satisfied; he continued on to earn his Ph.D. in strategic management from the University of Maryland.

After returning to Hawk Hill in September of 2004 as a professor in the Management Department, Maggitti soon moved on to Broad Street, heading to Temple University in 2006.

Maggitti then moved on to Villanova in June of 2008 and worked as a professor of management and entrepreneurship at the Villanova School of Business for four years.

In July of 2012, Dr. Maggitti became the Dean of the Villanova School of Business – the same school that during his time at Saint Joseph's was the school's biggest rival – and now finds himself on both sides of the rivalry.

Fifteen minutes separates Saint Joseph's University and Villanova University; six miles of Lancaster Avenue divides Hawk Hill and the school on the Main Line. At first glance, the two rival schools may seem to have nothing in common, but dig a bit deeper and you'll surely realize that the two schools are more similar than most think.

"We both have great students that come from nice families; both are special communities," said Maggitti. "There are many more similarities than differences between the two schools. We both have a focus on service, on our Catholic traditions, but also on the community and the care for the person and the high level of interaction between staff and students."

It didn't take long for Maggitti to get accustomed to Villanova once he noticed how similar it was to Saint Joseph's.

"It wasn't hard, but you quickly realize how similar the schools are," he said. "There is a rivalry there, but I quickly felt at home at Villanova. I have met many families where one person in their family graduated from Villanova and another from Saint Joseph's."

An example of the "WildHawk" mix is Chris Gheysens, who earned his undergraduate degree at Villanova and his MBA at Saint Joseph's, and is the current CEO of Wawa, a Philadelphia staple. Maggitti taught Gheysens in one of his MBA classes, and Gheysens now serves on the Dean's Advisory Council.

"Maybe the best option is a mix of education from both schools," Maggitti noted.

"I am a proud Hawk. I am so impressed by the campus, and I am a proud alum," Maggitti said about the growth and accomplishment of SJU over the past decade.

Maggitti never loses sight of what values and ideals Saint Joseph's taught him during his time here.

"I learned a lot from the faculty on what it means to be an ethical person," he said. "I experienced the care and concern of the faculty first-hand, how they cared for their students on a personal level. When I was a faculty member I reflected on my teachers at Saint Joseph's and how great they were to students and I think it has made me a better faculty member and dean because of it."

Maggitti met his wife Sara (Turnbull) '92 on Hawk Hill; Sara was a fellow athlete, as she was the captain of the SJU field hockey team. Maggitti still has many ties to the SJU community as he is good friends with Joseph DiAngelo, the Dean of the Haub School of Business. Maggitti also stays in contact with his former golf teammate and current Vice President for Development and Alumni Relations, Martin Farrell '88. Maggitti was college roommates and is still close friends with Tim Curran '90, the Associate Athletic Director for Marketing and Corporate Partnerships.

"Dean DiAngelo is a great friend and mentor to me; he hired me to teach in the business school in 2004. It is a great opportunity for the schools to work together," said Maggitti.

Dean Maggitti will be in attendance when the Wildcats visit the Hawks in Hagan Arena for just the second time in the history of the matchup. When asked who he was rooting for, he responded diplomatically.
